Curriculum Development and Outcomes

The Living on the Land curriculum was developed by a diverse team of educators from eight western states. First released in 2001, more than 1450 copies have been distributed to 40 states and 4 foreign countries. The curriculum has received awards of excellence from the American Society of Agronomy, the Association of Natural Resource Extension Professionals, and the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA). The Idaho Living on the Land program, developed by a 2001 workshop participant using the curriculum, received the Search for Excellence award from NACAA. This WSARE Professional Development Project updates and expands the curriculum to include new information on small acreage enterprises.
