Requirements

- \$20,000 maximum
- 36 month maximum
- 10% indirect cost maximum
- Enrolled in a graduate program by start of project
- **EARLIEST** Project Start date **October 1, 2025**

Goal

To fund projects related to some aspect of sustainable agriculture, addressing: economic viability of farms, improving environmental conditions related to agriculture, and/or quality of life for farmers

What is SARE?

Grants and outreach to advance sustainable innovations to the whole of American agriculture.



SARE is part of USDA and is funded through the National Institute of Food and Agriculture or NIFA program.

SARE's purpose is to provide grants and outreach to advance sustainable innovations to the whole of American agriculture.

The North Central Region of SARE consists of those sharing the geography of these 12 states: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

- College/Univ can be outside region if majority of work happens in our region

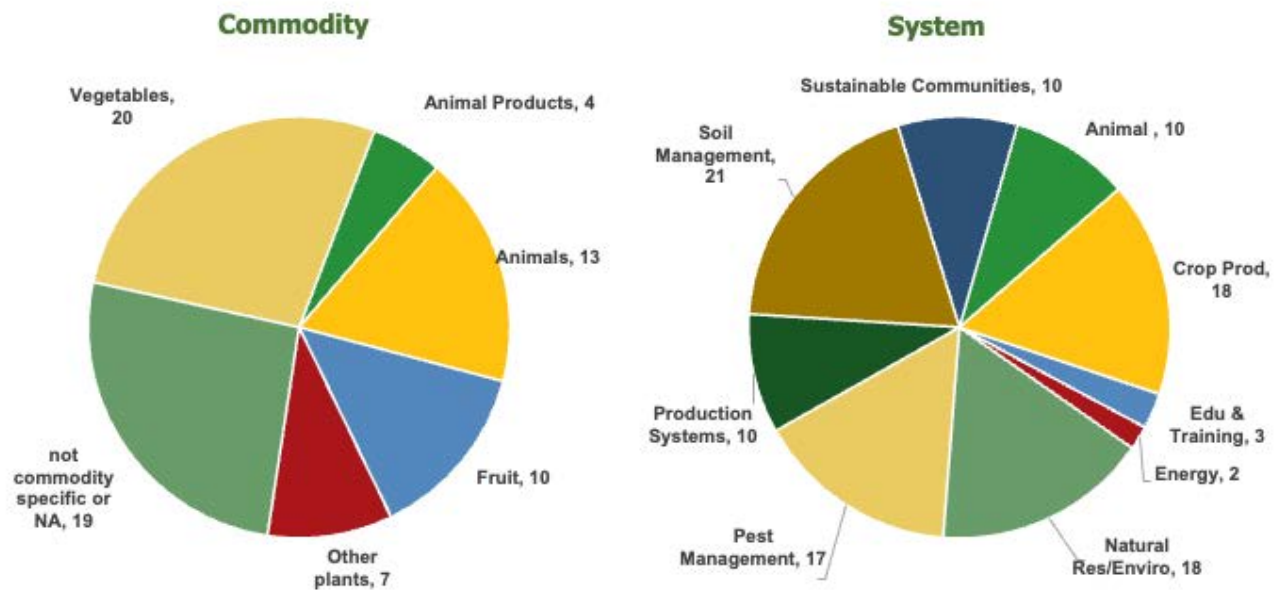


Why apply?

- Build your network of peers regionally

- Great practice framing your work to be meaningful to farmers and ranchers
- Helps build your portfolio of published work

Writing tips

- Read Call for Proposals carefully
- Make it VERY clear
 - How your project helps SARE meet our goals
 - What you plan to do, how you'll do, it and why
 - You have the right team and tools to do the work well
- Start early
- Set realistic budget
 - Explain how every item is calculated
- Keep reviewers in mind
- Seek help as needed



Impact on agriculture in North Central Region

What do you want to happen because of your project?

Will it help farmers and ranchers, their associated businesses, and their communities with...

- Improving economic viability?
- Sustaining and improving environmental quality?
- Enhancing quality of life as a whole?



Another common question is clarifying what we mean by outcomes and impacts.

As a public institution, we must be mindful of documenting the impact of our funds.

A critical aspect of the proposal is to indicate how your project outcomes align with NCR-SARE broad-based outcomes the 3 legs of sustainability.

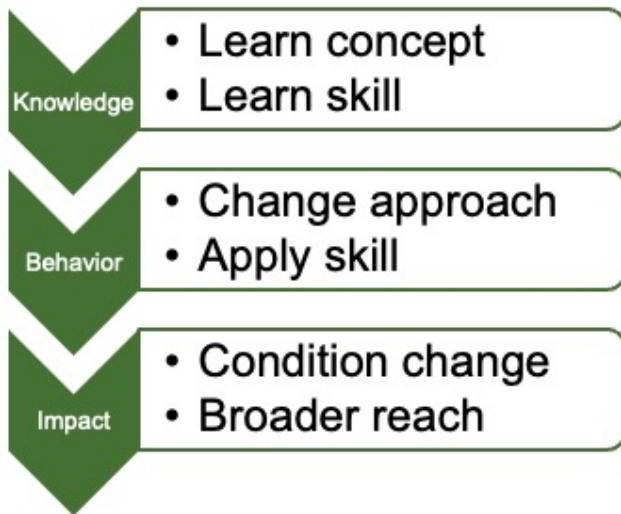
- Improving the economic viability of farmers and associated agricultural businesses.
- Sustaining and improving the environmental quality and natural resource base on which agriculture depends.
- Enhancing the quality of life for farmers/ranchers, communities, and society as a whole.

What long term impact are you trying to achieve with your project?

Even if your project focuses on one of these outcomes, you should indicate how the outcomes might impact all three.

These are long term condition change impacts. They take time, but show the connection between your project and them.

OUTCOMES AND IMPACT



To define your project outcomes—think about what you want to happen as a result of you completing this project. Learning outcomes can happen fairly quickly, and are things like changes in awareness, skills, knowledge or attitude; action outcomes are changes in behavior, practice or decision-making, and those are the outcomes that might achieve at the end of your project.

Think about how you might know you achieved

- Knowledge gains
- Behavior change
- Condition change/Impact
- How many people do you expect to attend events?
- How many do you expect to have a gain in learning?
- How will you measure if you are meeting those expectations?

OUTCOMES AND IMPACT

Example



Here's one example. Perhaps you are an Extension Educator and there are a group of growers that are interested in learning strategies and techniques for selling to institutions, a they have seen other models out east. You might put together a project to bring out a speaker or curriculum, and get the group together on someone's operation to learn from the speaker, or do site visits for each operation.

- Notice that these are measurable things. As you develop your plan think of how you will measure your results. How will you know if you achieved your goals.

WHAT DO SARE GRADUATE STUDENT GRANTS FUND?

proposals that contribute to farmer or rancher...

- economic viability,
- environmental quality,
- enhancement of the quality of life of farmers or ranchers, their communities, and society as a whole

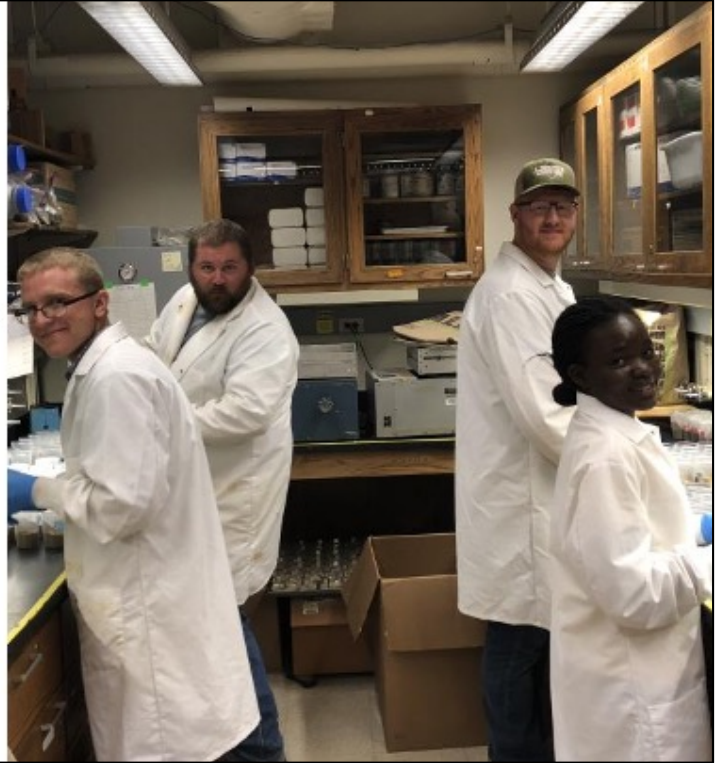
Prepare to Apply



So you've got an idea you think would make a good proposal. Now what?
Let's get you ready to apply.

STEP #1: DECIDE: Is your idea a good fit?

- Read the Call For Proposals BEFORE you start your online application.
- Look at what's been funded recently that relate to your idea.
- Note how your ideas is similar or different. How do they complement each other?



First let's talk about your project idea.

NCR-SARE staff and state coordinators would love to talk with you about your ideas, to see what would work best, and how we may assist you.

Budget Item Examples

CAN pay for project expenses

- Partial salary
- Farmer time
- Supplies
- Equipment (Max \$5000)
- Travel
- Meeting expenses
 - Food allowed if part of meeting continuity
- 10% indirect costs

CANNOT pay for

- Permanent structures
- Branded attire, promotional items
- Tuition

Reporting

Plan to gather this data

Part of the obligation of receiving funds is to report your activities and outcomes of the project.

Sharing results

Reports

- Annually, unless shorter than an 18-month project
- Final (60 days after project completion)
- Submit in projects.sare.org

WHO DECIDES WHICH PROPOSALS GET FUNDED?

A peer review panel...

...using scoring criteria found in the Call for Proposals.

Pro Tip: Try scoring your own application (or ask someone else to), and improve it based on that assessment.



See the Call for Proposals to see the scoring criteria that the Peer Review Panel uses to evaluate all proposals.

The review committee is a mix of faculty advisors, farmers/ranchers, non-profit and government personnel. They may or may not specialize in your area of study. So make sure to limit or explain jargon, and explain your project clearly.

Date	Item
May 29, 2025	Proposals due online by 4:00
Late July, 2025	Applicants notified
October 1, 2025	Funds available to applicants
March 1, 2027	Annual report due*
Project end date	Final report due 60 days later

* If project end date is close to March 1, may only need to do the final report.

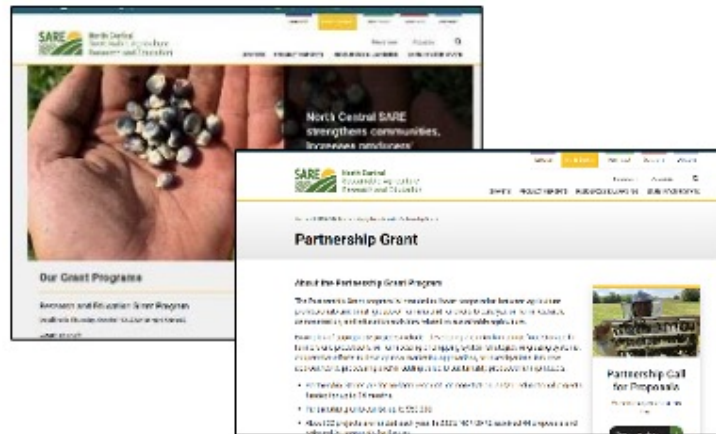

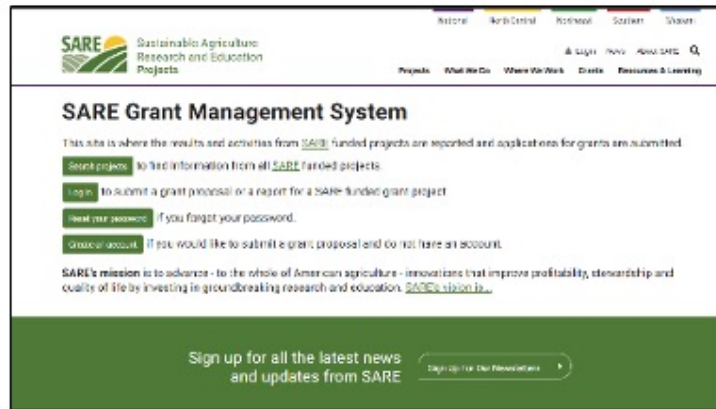

ONC22-098 - Exploration of Fiber Hemp Production and Quality

Exploration of Fiber Hemp Production and Quality will study fiber hemp production practices and how variety, nitrogen rates, and seeding rate affect fiber hemp dry matter production and fiber quality. Fiber research and business partnerships will be established to continue growing this industry.

ONC22-104 - Using perennial groundcovers for improved soil and nutrient retention in corn/soy production

This project will determine whether planting corn-soy rotations into Kentucky Bluegrass or Kura Clover perennial groundcovers, also known as perennial cover crops, is an economically viable strategy to limit soil and nutrient loss through on-farm demonstration trials.

ONC22-101 - Use of a Cover Crop to Reduce Soil Crusting and Improve Soybean Emergence

Heavy rainfall after planting can cause a hard, compact, and brittle surface soil. Farmers face seedling death and loss of productivity due to this soil crust. Our goal is to promote the successful adoption of a cover crop prior to soybean planting to reduce the effect of soil crusting.

ONC21-082 - Midwestern Hemp Database: Utilizing Grower-Cooperator Networks to Assess Variety Performance of Industrial Hemp Across the North Central Region

Applied research and outreach across the North Central region assessing production practices, variety performance, and laboratory analysis methods of industrial hemp through university research trials and on farm data collection via grower cooperator networks and private laboratory partnerships.

ONC21-092 - Harvesting Our Potential: Growing Skills, Confidence and Sustainability

Women farmers and landowners will network and learn skills necessary for increased confidence in their ability to be economically self-sufficient through sustainable agriculture careers, while also building connections with other women at all stages of their own careers.

Body of the Proposal

1) Summary

Provide a summary of your project (400 words)

2) Impact on sustainable agriculture in the North Central Region

Discuss the broader impact of the project on each of the 3 legs of sustainability: economics, environment, farmer/rancher, community and societal quality of life. (75 words each)

3) Outcomes

What farmer/rancher knowledge gains or behavior change do you anticipate from the project? (250 words)

4) Statement of the Problem, Background, Justification

Explain the need for the project How does it add to the larger body of knowledge? What problem does it address? (1,000 words)



Body of the Proposal

5) Approach and methods

Think Materials and Methods. What are you going to do? How will you get it done? Rough timelines encouraged. (1,000 words)

6) Outputs

What are the tangible things that will happen? Number of farmers reached, field days held, handouts/presentations produced, etc (250 words)

7) Outreach

How will you share your results with your intended audience and beyond? Press release, poster presentation, podcast, etc. (250 words)



Body of the Proposal

8) Evaluation

How will measure the impact of your project? How many farmers/ranchers did change their knowledge or behavior based on your project? Surveys? Interviews? Downloads? Etc (250 words)

9) Experience and roles

Who will be involved in the project? How can reviewers be confident they have the skills and knowledge to successfully complete the project? (1,000 words)

10) Response to reviewer comments

If this is a resubmission, indicate how you addressed comments previously provided by reviewers (400 words)

Budget tips

- Need for each budget item must be explained for the project.
- Calculations for amount requested are required – show your math.
- Budgets are reviewed before grant is awarded to ensure it is a reimbursable expense.
- Meals can be included if part of the continuity of an event, and require an attendee list and agenda to be reimbursed.
- Call with questions while writing proposal if needed.
- 10% indirect expense maximum

Example

- Total direct = \$18,187 +
- Total indirect = \$ 1,8717
- Total request = \$19,995



BUDGET AND “JUSTIFICATION”

What do you need to carry out the project? Examples:

Category	Description	Amount	Justification
Materials and Supplies	Wine Cap Mushrooms	\$60	\$30 each x 2 packages = \$60
Materials and Supplies	Tomato starts	\$80	\$4 each x 20 plants = \$80
Personnel		\$1168	73 hrs x \$16/hr = \$1168
Travel	Dav Hay travel to present results at farming conference	\$55	82 miles round trip x \$0.67/mile = \$55

- **May take 1 week + to get signed**
- Complete entire application, print it, submit it and the unsigned form to your grants office ahead of the deadline.
- Attach completed form as last step before submitting
