
How Did We Get Here? ...Important Dates in History

- Congress passed Morrill Act of 1862 establishing land grant institutions
- Smith Lever Act of 1914 (cooperative extension in each county)
- Lac Courte Oreilles Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Charter LCOOCC in 1982
- Congress passed the Equity and Educational Land Grant Status Act of 1994 (PL 103-382)
 - Establishing Tribal Colleges & Universities as land grant institutions to provide non-formal community education & outreach to supplement existing programs to an underserved population

LCOOCC 1994 Land Grant by the Numbers

- Serve 5 Tribe's in NW Wisconsin
- Small staff: 3 FT, 1 PT
- Serve over 1,000 participants each year in community education activities
- Student enrollment approx. 250 FT 75% Native
- LCO Reservation population 3,500 members living on the reservation
- Approx 77,000 acres of land; 350 acres ag land
